A return to alert level 1 means that you are welcome on school grounds to pick students up at the end of the day. There are QR codes displayed on classroom doors and around the school. We did find last year that dropping off and going from the gate in the mornings increased student's independence and readiness to settle into class so encourage you to drop and go in the mornings.

Room 7 is on assembly prayers this week and we warmly invite parents to join us.

Our camps and EOTC are in full swing and this change in levels is a great relief after all the planning.
